Lift Line provide 87,000 rides per year to 600 low-income elderly and disabled clients living within 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. Destinations include Elderday, Meals on Wheels dining sites, medical appointments, out of county medical facilities, a shuttle to the winter homeless shelter, and the children's hospital at Stanford. Some Lift Line rides are funded through TDA sales tax revenues, currently at \$627,000. Another funding source is Caltrans 5310, which provides equipment and operating funds of \$500,000 last year. Area Agency on Aging via Seniors Council provides \$39,000 for clients to access rides to Meals on Wheels dining sites. Cities and county provide additional funding for contracted service levels, and private grants and outside contracts provide unrestricted funds. For the past three years Lift Line has been meeting a \$15,000/year deficit repayment plan. Staff has absorbed a lot of these costs. Lift Line currently employs 13 drivers, 7 scheduling and dispatch staff, and 2 mechanics. When Lift Line had previously contracted to provide all Metro ParaCruz rides, the program had 50 drivers and 33 office staff. With next year's TDA funds, a 5% increase will allow Lift Line to expand Alliance dialysis rides to help restore service to clients following ParaCruz cuts in September 2015.

SCHEDULE 'A' Composition Shingle system:

- A. Shelton Roofing will obtain all necessary permits and set up all inspections pertaining to the roof only. Please note that there are any current recorded code violations, they must be cleared by the homeowner before a roof permit can be obtained.
- B. Tear off existing roof; remove and dispose (this includes hauling all debris, removed by Shelton Roofing, to the local disposal site.)
- C. Inspect exterior sheeting for termite and dry-rot damage. Consult and correct.(after the roof is removed and the sheeting has been exposed, Shelton Roofing will access and correct any visible damage that Shelton Roofing feels will be a concern to the local inspector, which will be charged on a time and material basis). Shelton roofing is not responsible for damage that is not visible, or in other words, hidden from exterior sheeting or fascia.*
- D. Install nosing.
- E. Install 1 layer of Tiger Paw roofing underlayment.
- F. Install starter shingles.

- K. Install new ridge caps at all hip and ridge areas using Mountain Ridge brand ridge caps (preformed at the factory) which have one of the highest wind ratings in the industry. Standard ridge caps, which we do not use, are formed by the installer and therefore do not have a consistent look and can crack during application on cold days.
- L. Install a seamless aluminum gutter and downspout system.

As an important organization serving Santa Cruz County, you know what a vital community resource our local libraries are for residents of all ages and backgrounds. Young children, teens, seniors, community groups and people of all ages rely on our libraries every day.

However, throughout our ten-branch system, the library facilities themselves are seriously outdated and inadequate. Each branch is in need of major repair, remodeling or even replacement in order to meet the current and future needs of our community.

In order to continue providing services in the face of growing demand and modern technology, our local libraries must be renovated, modernized, and in some cases expanded or replaced. The Library System has placed a revenue measure on the June 2016 ballot to fund improvements to all our branches. In Santa Cruz County, our local libraries are a vital community resource. Young children, teens, veterans, seniors and community members of all ages rely on our libraries every day to finish homework, apply for jobs and stay informed.

With many local schools closing their libraries, our public libraries are more important than ever in supporting the quality of public education in Santa Cruz County. Our libraries offer programs for young children and provide a safe place for students after school. Many local seniors and others on fixed incomes also count on our extensive collection of books, electronic media and online databases and regularly participate in a variety of community classes, programs and activities.

Local Libraries Must Be Repaired

In order to continue providing critical services to our community, our local libraries must be updated. Old, worn out, leaky roofs have ruined library materials and must be replaced. In fact, one branch's roof is over 50 years old. Additionally, branches have outdated boilers that need frequent repair and old bathrooms that need major renovation.

Our libraries offer access to free, up-to-date computer technology, including fast and free wireless internet access for all. However, some of our libraries have electrical systems that predate computers and must be renovated to handle the high-tech needs of today's libraries. In our modern world, it is crucial that all libraries provide access to e-books, databases and 21st-century technology.

Local Funding to Protect Community Libraries

Santa Cruz Public Libraries has begun exploring various funding options to address these needs in our local libraries. While no final decisions have been made, the Santa Cruz Libraries Facilities Financing Authority is considering placing a \$67 million bond measure on the ballot in June 2016 that could be used to:

- Replace worn out, leaky roofs
- Upgrade outdated and inadequate electrical systems so that they are able to support the high-tech needs of modern libraries
- Provide space for young children and teens, including story time, homework and after-school programs and expanded collections
- Improve old bathrooms and replace outdated boilers
- Improve and expand libraries in underserved communities

Every Penny for Santa Cruz Public Libraries

Every penny generated by a local funding measure would be dedicated solely to Santa Cruz Public Libraries. Mandatory accountability provisions would ensure that all funds are spent as promised.

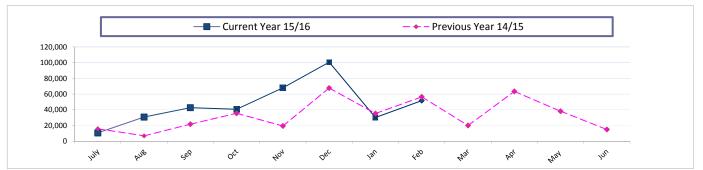

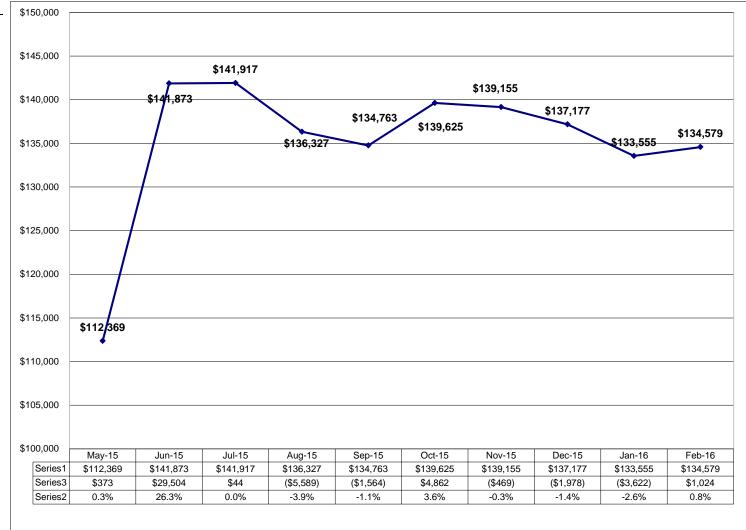
