Bridging the summer lunch gap: 200 more youth to be served

Some 200 more Santa Cruz-area children can count on eating lunch this summer, thanks to Community Bridges.

Responding to increased community need, La Manzana Community Resources, based in Watsonville, has expanded its Summer Lunch Program from 12 to 15 sites this year, adding locations at San Andreas, First Christian Church and Sunny Meadows.

La Manzana Community Resources, a program of Community Bridges, expects to serve 18,000 meals to 600 youth this summer, up from 14,000 meals to 400 youth last year.

La Manzana Community Resources has been sponsoring this program for 22 years. For the second summer in a row, the program has extended its service to ensure there is no gap between the end of school and the beginning of the Summer Lunch Program. The lunch program now runs from June 9 through August 21.

In addition to a free, nutritious lunch, each of the 15 sites provides games, activities and food demonstrations to encourage healthy eating and physical exercise, while keeping children engaged.

"It's so important to step up in the summer months, especially with a growing portion of kids in our community relying on free meals at school," said Raymon Cancino, CEO of Community Bridges, a nonprofit organization that operates La Manzana Community Resources and nine other human services programs throughout Santa Cruz County. "We know how strongly food, poverty and hunger can affect the wellbeing of our kids, and we're proud to be a part of the programs, schools, and community volunteers who come together to make this work possible."

According to the 2014 Santa Cruz County Community Assessment Project, the percentage of students receiving free or reduced cost meals in Santa Cruz County increased from 45 percent during the 2007-08 academic year to 55 percent in 2013-14.

The Pajaro Valley Unified School District and Live Oak Elementary School District had the greatest percentages of students receiving free or reduced cost meals in 2013-14 (77 percent and 60 percent respectively). (2014 CAP, p. 164).

Funding for La Manzana Community Resources' Summer Lunch Program comes from the California Department of Education, the United States Department of Agriculture, the County of Santa Cruz, the cities of Watsonville and Santa Cruz, and Community Bridges.

However, La Manzana is reimbursed for only 67 percent of the costs for providing meals, and is seeking donations from the public to make up the difference. Individuals can also support the Summer Lunch Program by volunteering to serve food at the various sites.
