MAJOR ECONOMIC IMPACTS OF COVID-19



MAJOR ECONOMIC IMPACTS



GLOBAL / NATIONAL IMPACTS

- Services and manufacturing sectors plunged to record lows
- Travel and tourism sectors the hardest hit
- Drop in foreign direct investment and global trade
- Lower energy demands
- Government bailouts and budget deficits
- Higher unemployment
- Worldwide restrictive measures which vary widely by country and state







COUNTY IMPACTS

- Largest economic sectors impacted differently
- Small businesses heavily impacted
- High unemployment
- Higher assistance needs
- Reduced revenues resulting in staffing and service changes

COUNTY REVENUE SOURCES




COUNTY TAX SOURCES

The average County property tax payer contributes \$5,505 annually.


REVISED BUDGET

- Advanced Deferred Maintenance



RELIEF FUNDS: FEDERAL FUNDING

HEROES ACT



State and local aid

Hazard pay to essential workers

Economic impact payments of \$1200 per gamily member / \$6,000 per household

Emergency grants to small businesses

COBRA subsidies

Extension of unemployment payments

Funds to assist with rent, mortgage, utilities and other housing-related costs

Provides flexibility in use of CARES Act funding use


Additional funding for testing, hospitals/providers

Additional funding for childcare


Reimagining service models

Elimination of some programs


- Cannabis Compliance Unit

STAFFING CHANGES



Staff furloughs of 5%, 7.5%, or 10%

Reduction of 88.65 positions (10 due to State mandated changes) 52.10 unfunded

37.25 potential eliminations

CONTINUED UNCERTAINTIES




State budget / trigger cuts

- Adopted Budget 2020-21 By September 15

SUMMARY

- Revenue losses of \$23.1m or 13.9%
- Use of \$14.2m from reserves
- Increased contingencies
- Staffing losses of 88.65 positions
- Uncertainties remain
- Fiscal prudence continues to be necessary
