

Meals on Wheels for Santa Cruz County delivers more than 150,000 meals annually to over 1,700 seniors, offering a lifeline of independence, health, and dignity. But now, due to rising costs and recommended budget cuts, we face a critical funding shortfall that could turn away 1,035 seniors and cut 125,000 meals over the next three years.

## Tell Our Supervisors to Help Us Protect Santa Cruz County's Seniors

Meals on Wheels for Santa Cruz County is more than a meal delivery program—it's a lifeline. We proudly serve over 1,700 local seniors each year, delivering more than 150,000 meals directly to their homes and offering nutritious meals at dining sites across the county. Our services provide independence, health, and dignity, empowering seniors—the fastest growing population in our community—to live safely in their own homes.

But now, for the first time in nearly 50 years, we face a crisis.

Due to recommended budget cuts from the County of Santa Cruz through its CORE funding program, rising costs, and increased demand, Meals on Wheels faces a six-figure funding shortfall. **This deficit will force us to cut back services and turn away 1,035 seniors from the program over the next three years, resulting in the loss of more than 125,000 meals over that time.** 

We need your voice. By joining us in advocating to the County Board of Supervisors, you can help keep your local Meals on Wheels program serving every senior who depends on us.

Meals on Wheels for Santa Cruz County has served nearly 10 million meals to more than 75,000 seniors since 1976. We're one of the few Meals on Wheels programs statewide without a waitlist and provide meals free of charge, ensuring our reach to those most in need. But without adequate funding from the County, we'll be forced to reduce services starting in July 2025.

#### Why Meals on Wheels Matters

Our program is vital to local seniors, many of whom live in poverty, face nutritional risks, or have disabilities. No other organization provides the door-to-door services Meals on Wheels does while also working with the population that we do. Many of our seniors live in poverty (78%), face nutritional risks (67%), have disabilities (66%), or live alone (54%). They rely on us for food, companionship, and safety.

And the impact of our program is undeniable:

- 92% of participants say Meals on Wheels helps them live independently.
- 87% feel safer at home.
- **79%** report eating healthier foods.

As the senior population in Santa Cruz County grows faster than anywhere else in California, demand for our services will only increase. At the same time, food costs have risen by over 20% in the past three years, stretching our resources to the limit.

# **Expanded Access to Universal Pre-Kindergarten at Highlands Park Center**

Community Bridges is excited to announce that Highlands Park Center in Ben Lomond, part of our Early Education Division, is now offering free or low-cost preschool through the California State Preschool Program (CSPP). This expansion provides affordable, high-quality early education to more local families, especially in a region where the cost of living and childcare are among the highest in California.

In Santa Cruz County, many families struggle to afford childcare, often having to choose between basic needs like rent or quality early education for their children. Through subsidized care at Highlands Park, families with children ages 24 months to 5 years can access enriching programs with flexible scheduling at minimal or no cost.

In most cases, families earning less than \$130,000 per year can qualify for child care for free or at a reduced cost. This change ensures that more children can benefit from early learning in a safe, nurturing environment.

# **Support Our Big Idea for Santa Cruz Gives: Wrap Them in Care – WIC Diaper Initiative**

Community Bridges is proud to be part of Santa Cruz Gives this year, with a powerful initiative aimed at meeting a growing need in our community—*Wrap Them in Care: WIC Program Diaper Initiative.*Diapers are an essential item for families with young children, yet rising costs have created a heavy burden for many parents. Nationally, one in three mothers faces *diaper scarcity*, forcing difficult choices between essentials like food, rent, and basic hygiene.

Our local Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Program has provided critical support to families in Santa Cruz County and the Pajaro Valley since 1977, serving thousands of mothers, infants, and young children. Last year, we recognized the urgent need for diaper assistance and launched the WIC Diaper Program, which has since provided over 850 diaper packs to families in need. But as prices continue to rise—up 22% since 2018—the demand for diaper assistance has far exceeded our available resources.

Our goal through Santa Cruz Gives is to raise funds to expand this program, enabling us to tell every family that they can come to their WIC appointments and receive diaper support, no questions asked. Unfortunately, federal funding for WIC does not cover the cost of diapers, making local support essential to continue this effort.

# **Steady Progress in Pajaro Unmet Needs Program: Over \$800K in Aid Distributed**

In our summer newsletter, we shared updates on Monterey County's Pajaro Unmet Needs Disaster Assistance Program. As a nonprofit partner in this program, Community Bridges, along with Catholic Charities Diocese of Monterey, manages \$5.4 million in household and individual aid. Phase 1, completed on April 27, provided \$450,000 to cover food spoilage for 688 families. Now in Phase 2, we're addressing more complex recovery needs, including housing, home repairs, and vehicle replacements.

Between April 27 and November 11, 2024, Community Bridges and Catholic Charities have distributed approximately \$803,000 to 76 households impacted by the 2023 floods.

We continue to work with about 300 families, assisting them with eligibility requirements and moving additional households off the



waitlist. Our team is committed to ensuring every qualified household receives the support they need.

Community Bridges remains dedicated to the long-term recovery of Pajaro families. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and collaborative partnerships, we provided over \$1.7 million in direct support to more than 1,000 individuals and families in the first year after the flood. Now, through the leadership of Monterey County and the advocacy of our state partners and legislators, we are able to continue this crucial support for survivors.

We will keep you updated in the coming months and appreciate your ongoing support.

## **Ray's Corner**

### **Facing an Uncertain Future**

As the dust settles from the recent elections, we want to assure you of our unwavering commitment to supporting and advocating for every member of our community, regardless of immigration status. At Community Bridges, we have always worked to build bridges of hope, light, and opportunity, providing essential resources and support to our most vulnerable populations. We stand firm in this commitment now and into the future.

In collaboration with local law enforcement, nonprofits, health organizations, safety experts, and government leaders, Community Bridges has signed a letter of solidarity to support our immigrant community in this uncertain time. Together, we affirm:

"As leaders in local government, we unequivocally reaffirm our commitment to supporting all immigrants in our community. A relationship of trust between immigrants and local agencies, including law enforcement, first responders,



schools, and hospitals, is essential to assuring that all residents feel safe and healthy and have access to the resources necessary to help make our community a better place for all."

Our shared commitment extends to upholding protective measures, such as the <u>California Values Act (SB 54)</u>, the <u>TRUTH Act (AB 2792)</u>, and local sanctuary resolutions, to ensure a safe and supportive environment for everyone.

While there has been much rhetoric and some indication of potential policies that could impact our community, we are uncertain of what is to come. As we await specifics from the incoming administration, please know that we are vigilant and prepared to inform you about any developments that may affect our community and the 20,000 individuals we serve each year. **Rest assured, we are committed to responding proactively to any community issues that arise and may impact us locally.** 

We remember the climate of 2016, when many low-income and Latine families faced immense fear. This fear led to a concerning trend of community service disenrollment across all sectors, as families worried about potential immigration consequences simply for seeking help. The impact was profound, driving many into deeper poverty, with negative effects on their health and education, leading to certain generational impacts that we continue to address.

Today, we are preparing our community with important educational information, particularly on <u>public charge</u> and other immigration rules as well as <u>Childcare Safety Planning</u>, so families are better prepared in case they are put in a situation in which they must make a difficult decision.

While many challenges are uncertain, our commitment to responding is not. We invite you to join us in strengthening our community:

- **Donate:** Support our work as we face an increased need for services.
- **Volunteer:** Give your time to make a tangible impact in someone's life.
- **Advocate:** Stay informed, ask questions, talk to your representatives, and stand by your neighbors.
- **Legal Aid:** If you are an immigration attorney able to provide support, please contact us to coordinate efforts.

We've faced difficult times before and pulled through by supporting each other. No matter what comes our way, we remain steadfast in our mission: to deliver essential services, ensure equitable access to resources, and advocate for health and dignity at every stage of life.
