Expanding Assistance to Support Families Affected by the 2023 Levee Breach

The Pajaro community has shown incredible resilience in the face of the March 2023 Pajaro Levee breach. From the very beginning, Community Bridges has been deeply committed to supporting families through this challenging time.

Working alongside our state representatives, partners, local leaders, and the greater community, we helped secure \$20 million in state funding to assist Pajaro residents in their recovery. Through the Pajaro Unmet Needs Disaster Program, which accounts for \$5.4 million of that state assistance, we're providing financial relief, case management, and advocacy to ensure every family has the resources they need to rebuild. Through our Phase 1 recovery services, we have served 2.472 Pajaro residents, or 85.8% of all household members in the area.

We are excited to announce the expansion of Phase 1 assistance to provide additional funds to households that received evacuation assistance earlier this year. This is just the latest step in our ongoing work to support Pajaro families.

What You Need to Know About the Expansion of Phase 1 Automatic Additional Assistance for Phase 1 Recipients

- Over the next 60 days, 688 households that previously received Phase 1 evacuation assistance will Awards will range from \$200 to \$1,000, based on household size.

 No action is required by recipients at this time—Community Bridges will reach out to eligible
- families with further details.

Why We're Expanding Phase 1 Assistance

Before the program began, it was difficult to fully understand the scope of damage to homes in Pajaro and what types of assistance would be most urgently needed. The levee breach created widespread devastation, and the recovery needs have been both complex and varied.

Initially, we knew that roughly \$14 million in individual assistance had already been distributed to Paiaro residents through local philanthropy, state assistance programs like the Storm Assistance for Immigrant Program, and federal aid such as FEMA. Given this, we prioritized ensuring that remaining funds were used strategically to support households struggling with the most significant and costly recovery needs, especially those with damage to their homes, vehicles, and personal property.

As we moved into Phase 2 and assessed the remaining unmet needs, we realized that we had enough flexibility within the budget to allocate additional funds for Phase 1 recipients. This reassessment was possible thanks to the leadership and flexibility provided by the **County of Monterey's leaders**, who have been instrumental in allowing us to pivot quickly to address these evolving needs.

 $Expanding \ Phase \ 1 \ assistance \ ensures \ that \ funds \ are \ distributed \ equitably \ and \ that \ all \ families, \ regardless$ of their circumstances, have access to the resources they need to complete their recovery. While this process took time, it reflects our commitment to ensuring that every dollar is used thoughtfully and effectively to help Pajaro residents rebuild.

w, with this second round of Phase 1 assistance, we are able to get funds directly into the hands of families in a timely and impactful way, addressing critical needs that persist despite earlier relief efforts.

Progress Continues in Phase 2

Since the launch of the Pajaro Unmet Needs Disaster Program in April, Community Bridges and Catholic Charities Diocese of Monterey have distributed over **\$1 million** in financial assistance directly to Pajaro families.

This includes \$464,000 distributed during Phase 1, which supported families with evacuation-related expenses, and an additional \$633,000 in Phase 2, aimed at covering a wide range of recovery needs, including home repairs, vehicle replacement, housing assistance, and personal property damages.

Our dedicated case managers have assisted more than **700 households**, connecting them to essential services and resources to navigate the complexities of recovery. Through ongoing collaboration with community partners and local leaders, we've ensured that **every eligible family has been offered**

While the distribution of funds so far marks an important milestone, we know the recovery journey is far from over. As we continue implementing Phase 2 and reassessing the evolving needs of the community, we remain steadfast in our commitment to supporting Pajaro families every step of the way.

To the Pajaro community: thank you for your incredible resilience. And to our partners and supporters: thank you for helping us provide hope and resources to those in need as they rebuild their lives.
